After playing college ball, Liverpool native Gedney left SU and went on to play professionally for the Chicago Bears and then with the Arizona Cardinals. He played tight end for six seasons in the National Football League and in 2000, Gedney was a finalist for NFL Man of the Year award.

Village Water Project

The Village of Tully has completed all pre-construction requirements in order to begin the work on the widely anticipated Village Water Improvements Project. This Project will replace the reservoir, the main pump station, and nearly 1/3 of the water lines in the Village. It will bring us up to 10 State standards -basically meeting current water code. The contract has been awarded to North Country Contractors, LLC. They are hoping to have everything on sight and begin operations in 2-3 weeks. Our own Village DPW will post notices on the houses of the neighborhoods that will be affected the week prior to the start of digging in that area to the best of their ability. The schedule will be highly dependent upon weather as we are heading into Fall. We will try to keep everyone as informed as we are able with as much notice regarding disruptions as we can give. During his tenure at Syracuse, Bill Pendock, along with Blaise Winter, Tim Green and Jamie Kimmel, earned the moniker "The Four Wheel Drive", considered one of college football's most renowned defensive lines. Gedney and Pendock brought their legendary expertise and experience to Tully's home field for this year's First In Ten football camp.

According to Coach Pierce, the First In Ten youth program has existed since the early 2000's and its important contributions have provided necessary equipment for the team and coaches as part of our Tully High School

football legacy. Contributions have included the game of football. new lights for the field, new headsets for the coaches, huddle programs for game films and other ongoing supportive measures for the football program. Pierce said the First in Ten is "is a breakaway" from traditional Pop Warner activity and joins a league of other southern tier teams, including Ithaca, Groton, Homer, Skaneateles and South Seneca. Coach Pierce commented, "We're trying to do what we can to keep the sport alive and keep it exciting", in spite of outside distractions and what he referred to as misinformation from the media regarding

This year's training camp, held at the Tully High School track and football field, ran over two evenings - Monday, August 8th, and Thursday, August 11. The event ended Friday, August 12 with a golf tournament for the school staff and parents. Regular football practice for the Black Knights 2016 season resumed Monday, August 15. In 2017, training camp will return for one week in August as the dog days of summer will again be the backdrop for aspiring young football players learning teamwork and camaraderie.

TULLY'S NEW PROPOSED BASEBALL FIELD

Tully needs another ball field. Tully needs resources to improve the existing fields and to create opportunities for kids k-12 to be active, not only in athletics, but with community service. There will be a meeting Wednesday, September 14 to discuss the merits of a new baseball field to be located adjacent to the town building, inside the walking path. The path will maintain its current form and be enhanced with the sights of both children playing and wonderful landscaping from various community organizations and school programs. There are always opportunities to improve our community and improve the opportunities for our kids. This is a project that will accomplish both.

Around 150 ballplayers from Tully used the fields this year. In addition, we hosted various school teams, summer ball teams and travel teams. Also, two co-ed adult softball teams requested field times but were denied because all fields were being used. There is simply not enough space in the spring and early summer.


Those that did have fields to play on, except the varsity players, played on fields that were less than mediocre. The school made improvements to the varsity field, but is hamstrung to improve further based on location. A significant part of the baseball budget for high school and summer ball goes to the balls that are lost to neighbors unwilling to return them or allow access to the kids to retrieve them. Rentable toilets, lack of proper drainage, lack of power and water, and no handicap parking are some of the other current drawbacks. This would all be alleviated with relocating the varsity field. In addition, parking would be much closer and a pavilion and concession stand, that largely go unused, would be viable. There is no junior high field for the school kids to use. They use the varsity field when it is available, or the unmaintained, town parks and rec field which is sized for kids in sixth grade or younger. This leads to less productive practices, canceled games and games relocated to other towns when conflicts arise. The younger age groups play in even worse conditions. Whether it is a pitcher looking directly into the sun or an infield so hard and barren of grass that any ground ball has to dodged rather than fielded, dangerous conditions exist that should not be part of the normal risk you would expect to take when stepping on a field. Some positive improvements have been made by parents and community members, but more needs to be done and they need the resources to do them. Imagine teaching young artists to paint without a brush. Challenging. Try teaching young pitchers their craft without a pitcher's mound. Try molding young hitters with no batting cage. Not productive. Our kids deserve these basic amenities. Every community I know of has both. We have neither.

A new field at Meetinghouse Road will allow this to change. Initially with Varsity and Modified, but soon after with boys and girls of all ages. What makes that possible is the ability, with two full size fields, to host tournaments and create a revenue stream through fees and concessions. That revenue will upgrade and maintain our fields. This model is used by communities all over, in many sports. Fabius uses it to maintain their fields to an excellent standard. Tully has an exceptional example with its boys and girls lacrosse tournaments. Money generated goes back to the community to help in other areas as well as to provide for the kids in those programs. Tournaments and games

played on well manicured fields not only offer great experiences for our kids, but also for those that travel here.

Tully needs to be a destination that neighbors from near and far enjoy and look forward to visiting. That is not the case now as it pertains to baseball. Teams and coaches avoid coming to Tully whenever possible. This can change.

Please come out on September 14 to show your support for our kids and to support Tully in becoming a community that takes pride in everything it puts forth.
