"King's Corner" Origin

It seems appropriate with "King's Corner Market" coming on August 1st that we provide some history about the corner. This article is from the archives at the Tully Area Historical Society and appeared in the August 1, 2016 issue of "Southern Hills News".

In 1818, Henry Fedello King moved from Connecticut to Tully. He built a modest building on the southeast corner of the main intersection which became King's Barter Store. No money ever changed hands. Instead, Mr. King traded potash from the farmers, and this he carted to Albany by ox team and brought back clothing and farm tools. It remained King's Barter Store through 1872.

The Boutelle family managed a business at this location from 1873 for a short time. Hulbert & Meara then operated a store there from 1889-1914. At that time there was a room with a door left of the main entrance which was the public telephone office with only one telephone for use by all villagers from 1889-1901. There was also a water pump and a weighing station on the side of the building.

From 1915-1945 this building was Gallinger's Grocery Store. Many of you may remember Norma Gallinger White, 1927 graduate of Tully High School and life resident of Tully. She was the daughter of Rueben and Lena Gallinger, proprietors of the store.

From 1945-1961 this was the home of Wortley's Drug Store. You could stop in not only for prescriptions and supplies, but enjoy ice cream and other soda fountain treats. Dr. Stephen Opalat occupied this building from 1962-1987.

Most recently, CURVES occupied the building from 2004-2014. Presently (2016), it is occupied by Rusty Wheel Pottery and Earth To Soul businesses.

Grass Clippings, Motorcycles, and State Laws

How Does Grass on the Road Kill Motorcyclists?

The two-wheeler concept represents an inherent safety weakness in the motorcycle's design. A bike needs to maintain constant contact with the ground to remain upright. Bad weather conditions do not offer much help with traction, and worn-out tires can aggravate the problem.

Many experts consider freshly cut grass clippings as hazardous as sand, gravel, or similar substances. Grass clippings act almost like sheets of ice when strewn or blown onto a paved road. Water constitutes up to 80% of grass causing it to become extremely slippery under pressure. Wet grass clippings after light showers can make things even worse.

Grass clippings on roads reduce a motorcycle's traction and can lead to a loss of control for the driver. A biker traveling at high speeds may fail to see these clippings in time, resulting in a motorcycle crash.

New York State law deems it illegal to leave grass on roads any injurious substances that can result in accidents. The law requires homeowners to remove any clippings that end up on the road as quickly as possible.
