Town Highway News

We are running this notice again as we would like to remind our residents of the rules and recommendations that will make it easier and safer for all of us.

With the winter season fast approaching, please remember the parking rules and laws that are in place for the Village, Town, and State.

There is no parking from 2am—6am on all roads from November 1st to April 1st in the village of Tully. This is for your and your cars' safety.

Article 1219 of the New York Vehicle Traffic law prohibits plowing, shoveling, or blowing of snow into a street or highway. This law also covers other items likely to pose a hazard to motorists including glass, nails,



wire, cans, etc. Fines for a first offense include up to a \$150 fine and/or 15 days in jail, plus applicable surcharges.

This law also stipulates that anyone that places or permits to be placed upon any highway any material which interferes with the safe use of the highway shall immediately remove the sum or cause it to be removed. **This includes SNOW!** If you are a homeowner and you hire a person to plow your driveway, and you permit him/her to plow snow into the road, you could be cited under this law.

The town highway dept asks that you respect the law as laid out above. This is for the safety of all. Compliance makes it easier for everyone concerned.

OPEN POSITION FOR GRIEVANCE BOARD OF ASSESSMENT REVIEW (GBAR)

The Grievance Board is a five-member board that works with the town assessor to hear grievances from Tully residents who feel that their property assessment is too high. The Board decides, based on documentation submitted from the resident and information from the assessor such as property values, as to whether the assessment should be lowered. They meet once a year on grievance day, usually in May, to hear grievances and may spend an additional day or two deliberating for which the Town pays each member a stipend. Healthy Habits to Help Protect Against Flu

The single best way to reduce the risk of seasonal flu and its potentially serious complications is to get vaccinated each year, but good health habits like avoiding people who are sick, covering your cough and washing your hands often can help stop the spread of germs and prevent respiratory illnesses like flu. There also are flu antiviral drugs that can be used to treat and prevent flu.

The tips and resources below will help you learn about actions you can take to protect yourself and others from flu and help stop the spread of germs.

1. Avoid close contact.

Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.

2. Stay home when you are sick.

If possible, stay home from work, school, and errands when you are sick. This will help prevent spreading your illness to others.

3. Cover your mouth and nose.

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick. Flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk.

4. Clean your hands.

Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.

5. Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.

Germs can be spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.

6. Practice other good health habits.

Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces at home, work or school, especially when someone is ill. Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food.

Preventing Flu at Work and School

At School

- Find out about plans your child's school, childcare program, and/or college has if an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs and whether flu vaccinations are offered on-site.
- Make sure your child's school, childcare program, and/or college routinely cleans frequently touched objects and surfaces, and that they have a good supply of tissues, soap, paper towels, alcohol-based hand rubs, and disposable wipes on-site.
- Ask how sick students and staff are separated from others and who will care for them until they can go home, and about the absentee policy for sick students and staff.

At Work

- Find out about your employer's plans if an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs and whether flu vaccinations are offered on-site.
- Routinely clean frequently touched objects and surfaces, including doorknobs, keyboards, and phones, to help remove germs.
- Make sure your workplace has an adequate supply of tissues, soap, paper towels, alcohol-based hand rubs, and disposable wipes.
- Train others on how to do your job so they can cover for you in case you or a family member gets sick and you have to stay home.
- If you begin to feel sick while at work, go home as soon as possible.
