The clean-up day is **ONLY** for Village of Tully and Town of Tully residents. You must show proof of residency and accompany vehicle at drop-off site. Proof of residency must have your street address on it. A Post Office Box will not be accepted as proof of residency.

All items must be less than 10 feet in length. All oil, gas and antifreeze products, which are not acceptable for disposal, must be drained from tanks and equipment.

IF YOU HAVE UNACCETABLE ITEMS ON BOARD, YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED ON SITE!

What WILL be accepted

Most general rubbish, appliances, metal, computers (flat screen monitors only, no CRTs), electronics, lawn & garden waste, vehicle batteries, empty drums and pails cut in half. Tires will be accepted off the rim at a cost (prices subject to change). Please have the correct amount of money, 16 inch and smaller tires: \$3. 17-inch and larger truck tires: \$7. Large tractor tires: \$25

What will NOT be accepted

Rechargeable or disposable household batteries, florescent tubes, brush, garbage, <u>TELEVISIONS</u>, recyclables, pails with lids, whole drums, paints, chemicals, oil, gas, antifreeze or any hazardous waste.

Please separate items to improve efficiency at disposal site.

Drop off station 1—Tires, vehicle batteries, empty propane tanks, computer monitors, keyboards, microwaves and major electronic components.

Drop off station 2— General Rubbish

Drop off station 3—All metals & appliances (except refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, dehumidifiers and humidifiers).

Drop off station 4—refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, humidifiers, box springs & mattresses.

Drop off station 5—Lawn and garden waste

Has Your Family Experienced Domestic Violence? Your Neighbors Have.

Every year, we are invited to participate in one cause or another, but there is one situation that is so urgent it shouldn't be ignored in 2016. October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month and its goal is to illuminate and educate us about this tragically personal and social danger to women, children and, yes, even men According to National Domestic Violence Statistics, 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 will experience severe physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime. You may say, "I don't have any problems and my neighbors seem alright". Actually, you do have neighbors who lost a daughter and their grandson lost his mother; but rather than allowing the tragedy to define them, they are continually championing the awareness of domestic violence.

Debbie and Keith Taber reside in the Tully area, with their grandson, Junior. On May 16, 2012, in Kentucky, three year old Junior was hiding and witnessed the brutal killing of his 24 year old mother, Autumn, at the hands of her boyfriend, Junior's father. Junior escaped the event physically unharmed (his father committed suicide hours later) and this remarkable young man has grown up cherishing his loving mother's memory while spearheading events to

increase public knowledge of domestic violence. In the words of Debbie Taber, "It's not just women who lose their lives from domestic abuse; many children also die. And more and more men are coming forward with their stories."

In a recent posting on their GoFundMe website, Junior had this to say... "Hi everyone, my name is Junior Rollings Taber. I'm 8 now and I lost my mommy to domestic violence 4 ½ years ago; I miss her very much. Everyone knows that I like to do something every year in October since that is Domestic Violence Awareness Month and that's how my mom was taken from us. With Nana and Grampys' help I am doing this in memory of my Momma, Autumn Rollings. I was just 3 ½ when I watched my father kill my mom and I miss her every day. All I have are some photos and videos and a few memories. So this year I am going to do a GOFUND ME account. I hope to raise a zillion dollars. I know that's a lot of money but I would pay a zillion dollars to have my momma back. All of the money will help a local Domestic Violence Shelter and also maybe get enough money to get a brick with mommy's name on it to place at a local Domestic Violence park walk. I try to do something every year besides sending up balloons with

messages on them to bring awareness to Domestic Violence. I don't like to think about other kids having to live without their moms like I have to. So if you all can donate to this, it would make me very happy. Can you please post this on your page so other people can see it and maybe donate or even pass it along to their friends? I would like to see this go around the world. Please help me bring awareness to the thing that sent my mommy to Heaven and away from me."

Debbie and Keith celebrate their daughter's life and Junior's memories of his mother. Don't think of them as victims of domestic violence. They are dedicated survivors with a goal to help others escape the fate of Autumn. As Debbie says, "Life isn't about waiting for the storm to pass; it's learning how to dance in the rain."

Baseball Field Resolution

A public meeting was held September 14th to discuss the possibility of utilizing land to the west of the municipal building to build a new baseball field. Attendance at the meeting was impressive with only a few open chairs and many in the hall waiting to speak or hear what was being said.

This issue, as with any project, has those who are for and those opposed.

Concerns about the new ball field revolved around the loss of green space, maintenance cost, construction costs and questioning the need for another ball field. Questions were asked about repairing the current ball field on the east of the school. It was answered that the cost to repair that field and make it regulation as well as raising home plate to avoid the flooding would be greater than construction of the new field.

The concerns about the use of the land was addressed as the land in question was designated as recreational fields as outlined in the adopted 1988 master plan, which was adopted by the former board. The walking trail will still exist in it's current fashion.

After a hour and a half of discussions and questions, the board called for a straw poll of the attendees on whether to allow the next steps. It was an over whelming vote for the affirmative.

Following the public forum, the board brought the proposed resolution (which can be found at http://townoftully.org) for a vote. The adoption of the resolution allows for the next steps in the process. It gives those who are looking for funding, be it private or grants, the tools required to pursue it.

With the passing of the resolution, the field is still subject to planning board approval, S.E.Q.R. review and a priority agreement

before it can actually be built. The funding for the field is private and no tax dollars will be used for the building of the field.

There are passions on both sides of this issue and it was amazing to see the response from the community to get involved in some way concerning this issue.
